Town Gains 4 Acres In Settlement Of Line Dispute

Little Compton, R. I. (AP) — This town has gained four acres in a settlement of its town line dispute with adjoining Tiverton, town officials announced today.

Since colonial days, the town boundary has run southwest, from the Massachusetts border to the vicinity of Pamomquit Pond and from there the last 300 feet have followed a small stream from the pond to the Skoonnet River.

But through the centuries, storms and the action of the tidal river have filled the stream, isolated the pond and erased the town line.

So the town councils of the two towns decided to employ a surveyor to establish a new line, and all agreed that it should be extension of the straight border rather than taking the dog-leg course of the old stream.

This pleased some people having summer places in the area, as it placed them in Little Compton, which has a tax rate of \$17 on each \$1,000 valuation.

Antone Tavares of Fall River discovered that his property is in both towns, the new line running through his house. On half of it he will pay this town taxes at \$17 while the other half will be assessed in Tiverton, which has a tax rate of \$18.40.

The mother, Mrs. Aurelia S. Plath, a Boston University professor, said her daughter's disappearance may have been due to a temporary nervous disorder linked to her writing.

Fiction Writer
Miss Plath was editor of the Smith Review, the college literary magazine, last year, and has sold fiction and poetry to magazines and other publications.

Mrs. Plath said her daughter "recently felt she was unworthy of the confidence held for her by the people she knew. For some time she has been unable to write either fiction, or her more recent love, poetry.

Arctic Period
"Instead of regarding this as just an arid period that every writer faces at times," the mother, "she believed something had happened to her mind, that it was unable to produce creatively any more."

Night-Long Vigil Fails To Get GG For 80 Children

New York (AP) — The dramatic effort of a group of parents to get anti-polio inoculations for their children by staging a night-long vigil received a setback today as the Office of Defense Mobilization again bucked their plea back to state officials.

Effort Rejected
The State Department of Health twice yesterday rejected efforts to obtain an allotment of gamma globulin for treatment of 80 children in the Far Rockaway section of Queens where a 32-year-old woman was stricken with infantile paralysis last Friday.

"As of now, it looks as though they cannot get it," said Solomon A. Klein, a representative of Mayor Impellitteri, who telephoned the ODM after listening to the renewed pleas of parents.

Sit Through Night
Fourteen anxious fathers and mothers had sat through the night at city Health Department offices to emphasize their demands and they were joined today by more parents.

Klein said he told Dr. Ralph S. Paffenbarger, in charge of distribution of the scarce gamma globulin blood derivative for the ODM, that the parents had offered to donate 100 pints of blood in exchange for the inoculations. Washington officials had previously declined yesterday to intervene in the situation.

Wiggins' Name OK'd For Air Taxi Service

Washington (AP)—The Civil Aeronautics Board has authorized E. W. Wiggins Airways to use that name in air taxi operations.

Wiggins' authority to operate as a local-service feeder airline in New England expired Aug. 1. The company, which has switched to air taxi flights, asked exemption from a regulation which prohibits air taxi lines from using "airways" or "airlines" in their names.

Air taxi operations are confined to cities and other limited localities.

Prints-On-Car Solve Series Of Breaks In N. H.

Portsmouth, R. I. (AP)—State Police announced today that fingerprints taken from a stolen car have led to solution of a long series of "break-ins" in Newport County.

They said that with the assistance of Fall River, Mass., police, the fingerprints were identified as those of Leonard Silvia, 20, of Fall River and Lionel E. Courlette, 19, of Tiverton, R. I. They have been in the New Bedford House of Correction since their arrest in Fall River in the vicinity of another stolen car.

Sgt. Thomas F. Straton said they have admitted six breaks into gas stations and cafes in Rhode Island and nine breaks in Fall River on the night of July 28. Small amounts of money and some liquor were taken in the breaks.

The car from which the fingerprints were taken was abandoned by two men, who got away, when police stopped it in Portsmouth, police said.

Orphaned Brothers Enlist In Marines

Providence, R. I. (AP) — Two brothers whose parents are dead signed up today for service in the special Rhode Island platoon of the U. S. Marine Corps.

John Francis Healy, 18, and Richard Warr Healy, 17, are sons of the late Mr. and Mrs. Francis J. Healy. Their father was killed in a truck accident near New Haven, Conn., 10 years ago and their mother died early this year.

Devoted Students

Paso Robles, Calif. (AP) — An elementary school burned down while students were on vacation. The children, instead of shouting with grief, hurried to the scene.

Totling as flames approached, they helped firemen and policemen carry out desks, books supplies and equipment valued at many thousands of dollars.

Officials warmly praised the youngsters for their assistance.
