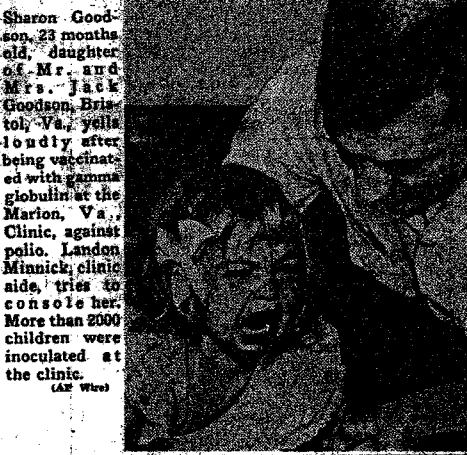
ABY KIDNAPED BY MADWOMAN

CLEVELAND (INS)—A gushing, hysterical woman—described as "mentally deranged"—kidnaped a three-week-old baby boy yesterday at the Mary Talbert hospital for unwed mothers on Cleveland's East side.

The woman, after loitering around the hospital for about an hour, brandished a revolver and forced two nurses on duty to move the youngest child in a nursery.

Emma Ellegard, superintendent of the hospital, said that a woman first approached Dr. E. Wallace and told him that her sister was giving birth to a boy in an automobile outside. Then, after the doctor left, she fled a revolver and herded the baby to a car.

The nurse described the woman as about 25 years old, wearing a red dress and a hat. She said she had two boys, ages 10 and 12.



Sen. Kennedy Returns From Europe for Bridal

Facing a busy two weeks in preparation for his marriage Sept. 12 to Jacqueline A. Bouvier, socialite heiress of Newport, R. I., U. S. Sen. John F. Kennedy arrived at Logan Airport from France yesterday, impatient for reunion with his fiancée.

"I'm heading for Newport right now to see her," the prospective bridegroom said. "It's my life the weather was better."

Kennedy said he found divided sentiment in France as reaction to his proposal for increased independence for French Indo-China.

"Communists and their sympathizers in France want to liquidate the fighting in French Indo-China so that the Viet Minh can get control of the country," he explained. "But we must remember that Indo-China is the key to southeast Asia, and Siam and Malaya could well be lost if Indo-China is lost."

The United States, Kennedy said, should urge the French to give Indo-China as much independence as possible to encourage and stimulate them to fight Communist aggression. He said there have been some changes in French sentiment, since the fighting in Indo-China has been a heavy drain on its economy and has prevented the nation from balancing its budget and aiding the Western Europe defense.

"Some want to settle the status of Indo-China by France, while others want the whole question turned over to the United Nations," Kennedy said.

When the case involving the 15-year-old girl was heard by Judge J. John Fox. She told of having gone out on dates with Miguel and admitted she had loved him.

When Atty. Thomas Britt asked: "You want to marry me?" the girl replied: "Yes, but I think I'm old enough. My parents talked it over with me." She denied that Miguel had attacked her, and Judge Fox dismissed the charge against him.

NORTHAMPTON—Search for possible heirs to a \$500,000 fortune left by an 86-year-old man, the former Springfield resident, who died in 1951 in a junk-filled tenement room in Brooklyn, N. Y., was officially launched here yesterday.

LIVERMORE FALLS, Me. (AP)—A farmer convicted of drunken driving went home yesterday to get money to pay his \$100 fine and shot himself to death.

Medical Examiner H. S. Pratt made a suicide finding in the shooting of Stephen O. Hines, 63.

Police Chief Cecil Ryder, who investigated, told this story:

Hines pleaded guilty in Livermore Falls municipal court and asked permission to get a bank check so he could pay the fine. State Trooper Forrest Melver drove Hines to his home in adjacent Livermore. Waiting outside the farmhouse, Hines had a shot and found Hines dead with a revolver bullet in his head.
