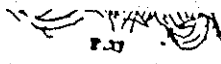

### State May Revoke Ban on School in Project Basement

The State Public Safety Department may reconsider its ruling against setting up an emergency grammar school in the basement of an isolated East Boston housing project. Deputy Public Safety Commissioner Rufus H. Bond yesterday informed a group of mothers who came to his office to protest the department's action.

The mothers, living in the new veterans' housing development on the bluff overlooking Suffolk Downs race track, told Bond that there is no primary school close enough so that their children may walk from the project. They argued, with the support of the clergy and state legislators from East Boston, that both the School Department and the City Building Department had approved the use of one of the project buildings for emergency quarters.

Bond said that he would seek further information on the matter from Roy A. Beaudry, Superintendent of Planning for the department, and make a personal inspection of the proposed school site. He will determine whether the original ruling might be reconsidered due to the emergency.

### Honor Student 'Out of Danger'; Took Sleep Pills

WELLESLEY, Aug. 26—Sylvia Plath, 20, who was found today in a coma-like state in the basement of her home after taking sleeping pills, was considered by doctors as "out of danger" tonight. The brilliant Smith College senior disappeared Monday, leaving a note saying she was going for a hike. She was found in a small room of the Plath basement, hidden by a woodpile, which she replaced after entering the room. Police, Scouts and volunteers had scoured the wooded countryside in a three-day search for the girl.

Today, her grandmother, Mrs. Aurelia Schohar, 66, heard moans from the area. She called Sylvia's brother, Warren, 18, who tore apart the woodpile and found Sylvia unconscious under a blanket. Forty of 48 sleeping pills were missing from a bottle she had with her. Doctors assumed she had taken the pills shortly after entering the cellar and had been in a semi-coma ever since.
