Last Red Try To Get OK on 'Stacked' Slate

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. — (UP) — Russia made a last, desperate move today to get United Nations approval for a communist-stacked slate at the Korean political conference.

As the general assembly's political committee prepared to vote on six resolutions on membership of the conference, soviet delegate Andrei Y. Vishinsky submitted an amendment to the membership measure sponsored by 15 of the countries that fought the Korean war for the UN.

The amendment would strike out the western ticket and insert in its place the soviet lineup. Vishinsky's amendment was regarded as a futile parliamentary move which had no chance of success.

The amendment was made at the close of debate on the makeup of the conference.

Fighter Plane Beats Speed of Sound At Level Flight

EAST HARTFORD, Conn.—(UP)—United Aircraft Corp., disclosed today it had developed a turbojet engine of new design which has repeatedly driven a fighter plane faster than the speed of sound on level flight.

William P. Gwinn, general manager of the Pratt & Whitney division said the engine was the Axial-flow J-57, the features of which could not be revealed for military security reasons. The engine powered the P-100 Super Sabre, the first supersonic fighter plane, built by North American Aviation.

Gwinn said the plane made "its unprecedented performance" on its first flight, and "has been followed many times by similar test flights." He said "the performance of the J-57 engine opens the way for a new generation of fighters which will normally be able to fly and fight faster than the speed of sound."

He said that the speed of sound previously had been surpassed only by fighter planes in dives, with the aircraft gaining a speed advantage by vertical or oblique flight.

"In level flight with nothing but the power of the engine to drive it forward," he said, "no combat aircraft had before driven through the sonic speed area and beyond it. A few research aircraft, among them rocket driven planes, have flown faster than the speed of sound in level, or even climbing flight."

The J-57 turbojet powered plane flew for the first time May 25.

WELLESLEY — (UP) — Miss Sylvia Plath, 20, missing Smith College honor student was found in the cellar of her home here today as an organized search for her was pressed by police and volunteers.

The girl, who was found by her brother Warren, was taken to the Newton-Wellesley Hospital.

Miss Plath had disappeared Monday, leaving a note in which she said she was "taking a long walk—be back tomorrow."

Her mother, Mrs. Aurelia Plath, said the girl had been under a doctor's care for nervous exhaustion.

Formerly of Melrose, Mass., Lane coached football at Boston University and at Harvard, and played hockey with the Bruin Cubs and New York Rangers.

LOS ANGELES, Cal.—(UP)—Dr. Lee DeForest, whose vacuum tube made radio, television, radar and talking pictures possible, celebrated his 80th birthday today and looked forward to "10 more years of hard work." The "father of radio" was honored at a luncheon given by the National Association for Better Radio and Television.

SCHENECTADY, N. Y.—(UP)—Frank B. Bailey, 89, treasurer of Union College for the past 51 years, died at his home in Locust Valley, L. I., early today, the college announced. Bailey, a graduate of Union in 1885, contributed more than \$1,500,000 to the college during his lifetime. Bailey served from office boy to president of the Title Guaranty Trust Co., in New York.

SHARON, Vt.—(UP)—A farmer's body was found hanging in an abandoned school house today — just three days before his scheduled wedding day — and authorities believed he had been slain by masked men who warned him recently not to get married. The body of Frank Krivak, 40, was hanging from a rafter but investigators said that a blow on the head — not strangulation — apparently caused death. Neighbors reported that two masked men threatened Krivak recently and warned him not to go through with his plans to marry Miss Marion Minor, 32, of Windsor next Saturday.

BOSTON.—(AP)—A license to conduct horse racing at the Northampton Fair, Sept. 7 to 12, was granted to the Hampshire, Franklin and Hampden Agriculture Society today, the State Racing Commission announced.

PROVIDENCE, R. I.—(AP)—The price of a quart of milk will go up one cent in Rhode Island next Tuesday, John P. Hull, executive officer of the State milk control board, announced today.

PROVIDENCE, R. I.—(AP)—Providence barber shop owners have decided they can't decide whether to close one extra day a week. The no-decision was announced today after a meeting of shop owners in the AFL Barbers Union, Local 224, by a committee conducting a referendum. About 70 per cent of the 225 shop owners said they approve of a five-day week, but they couldn't agree on which day to close.

NEW YORK.—(UP)—A threatened noon walkout of CIO long distance telephone workers failed to materialize today as union negotiators pressed for a "quick and peaceful" contract settlement with the American Telephone and Telegraph Co.

BOSTON.—(UP)—The American Bar Association's policymaking body today opposed so-called "book burning." The 224-member House of Delegates unanimously adopted a resolution which said: "The freedom to read is a corollary of the constitutional guarantee of freedom of the press and American lawyers should oppose efforts to restrict."

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
