

## PIKE'S PEAK PLAQUE HAILS AIR PIONEER

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo., Aug. 27.—(P)—“Quality” is the decisive edge in the race for superior aircraft and armaments, Lt. Gen. James H. Doolittle said at ceremonies atop Pike's Peak dedicating a bronze plaque to the late Dr. Sanford A. Moss, inventor of the turbo-supercharger.

The first test of the turbo-supercharger was carried out on 14,110-foot Pike's Peak in August, 1918.

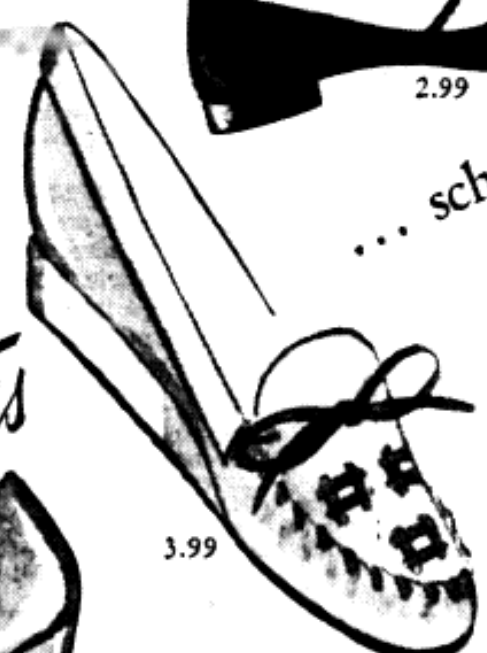
“Air supremacy can only be achieved by consistent, long-range scientific and technical programs of design, planning and development,” the retired air force general declared yesterday.

## Missing College Girl Found Under Porch

WELLESLEY, Mass., Aug. 27.—(P)—A pretty 20-year-old Smith College senior, who vanished Monday after telling her mother she was going hiking, was found semiconscious but apparently uninjured yesterday under the porch of her home.

While searchers fanned out, Sylvia Plath was located by her brother, Warren, 18, and her grandmother, Mrs. Aurelia Schobar, who heard moaning.

A nearly empty container of sleeping tablets was by the girl's side. Mrs. Aurelia S. Plath said her daughter had been depressed because "for some time she had been unable to write either fiction or poetry."
