ONLY ONE PRECINCT AGAINST CONTROL

As anticipated, the heaviest voting in favor of extending controls, which have technically been off since the lapse of federal restrictions on July 31, occurred in Precincts 5 through 10, which include (according to the most recent statistics available) all but about 700 of the town's 2,896 rented and rentable units.

In one precinct (number 5) where there are a considerable number of large apartment houses, the vote was 5 to 1 for controls. Precinct 9, the area on both sides of Hollis street, voted 4 to 1 for controls. In Precinct 7, located in the triangle of territory between Concord street, the main line of the B & A railroad, and the Natick boundary, the vote was 3 to 1 for controls. The only precinct to defeat the question was Precinct 1, where the vote was a close 57 to 52.

This is the first time that the voters at large have been called upon to review the action of the limited town meeting. There was much interest in the result of the referendum. The staff at The News answered many phone calls well into the evening. The final situation was in at the office of Town Clerk William S. Welsh less than half an hour after the polls closed.

May Avoid Trial of Miss McDonald in Somerville Slaying

State Will Not Seek Death Penalty Nor First Degree Murder Indictment

CAMBRIDGE, Aug. 28 (INS)—A 25-year-old Somerville receptionist, accused of the slaying of the young sister, of a former sweetheart who killed her, today was conceded a good chance of avoiding trial.

In any event, authorities said, the life of Mildred McDonald will be spared.

Held in East Cambridge jail following her return from New York where she was picked up by police, she was told the state would not seek the death penalty. She also was told that Mrs. Rose DiRocco, mother of Mary DiRocco, 14-year-old victim, had forgiven her.

District Attorney George E. Thompson announced a first degree murder indictment would not be sought against Mildred.

The Framingham planning board, through its chairman, B. L. Whittemore, today made public the following statement of its position on the proposed Massachusetts East-West Tollway:

The Planning Board of Framingham believes the time has come to make a statement of its position regarding the Massachusetts East-West Tollway problem.

When the so-called Northern route through the center of our large residential area was announced by the Framingham Planning Board was unanimously opposed to it and a statement was publicly made by its Chairman that we were.

The Chairman also made the statement at that time that an East-West limited access highway was essential to our state traffic problem and such a road would benefit Framingham by relieving the traffic condition on Route 9.

It was also the opinion of the Planning Board that it was unfair to recommend moving it out of our front yard into some other front back yard and therefore we were in favor of supporting a movement to demand information as to why it should not be built as originally planned over the so-called Readingville Route.

At the same time, an officer of the United Nations command said it appeared certain that the American General now is at Kaesop, awaiting his turn in the Communist schedule for repatriation.
