Universalists, Unitarians, Merge Some Work

The first joint biennial conference in the history of the Universalist and Unitarian churches adjourned yesterday after 800 delegates voted unanimously to merge three of two organizations, the major divisions.

The divisions—which will be incorporated under the title "Council of Liberal Churches (Unitarian-Universalists)"—are those of publication, public relations and education.

The move will have no immediate effect locally. Rev. Ralph M. Barker, pastor of the First Universalist Church, Rockport, told the Times today.

However, he added, the move is a partial step toward wider unification between the two religious groups, and, if successful, will pave the way to a general merger in the future.

India Stubborn On Conference Seat Question

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. Aug. 26 (INS)—India refused in the face of certain defeat in the UN assembly to withdraw her bid for a seat at the Korean Peace Conference.

It is estimated India will get perhaps 29 votes in the political committee today and fall short of the required two-thirds majority—or 40—in the assembly, which is expected to take final action tomorrow.

In addition to the resolution inviting the Asiatic nation to participate in the talks, five others are before the committee, which may clear the decks this morning for the assembly vote.

Air Force Reveals New Weapon

WASHINGTON, Aug. 26 (INS)—A new method of atomic attack is suggested today by an air force disclosure that its B-26 bombers can be equipped to launch and retrieve fighter planes in the air. Photo-reconnaissance versions of the B-36 already are launching speedy Jets. The jets are nabbed in mid-air with the aid of a "flying boom" that hooks itself to the nose and fuselage of the fighter plane.

Attorney General To Screen Off Reds

WASHINGTON, Aug. 26 (INS)—The Eisenhower administration has asked Attorney General Herbert Brownell to coordinate policy for all federal agencies dealing with Communist-dominated unions. The announcement means that steps will be taken to prevent members of Communist-led unions from handling secret government contracts in which security is involved.

Paris Strike Collapses

PARIS, Aug. 26 (INS)—Communism suffered a severe setback in France today as the overwhelming majority of French workers returned to their jobs and the strike movement collapsed.

Fourth POW Vessel Sails For U. S.

INCHON, Aug. 26 (INS)—The military transport General John Pope, fourth repatriation vessel to sail for America, left the Korean port of Inchon for San Francisco today with 442 released Americans. The group brought the total of American repatriates who have sailed from Inchon to 1,135.

US Envoy Confers With New Premier On Funds For Iran

TEHRAN, Aug. 26 (INS)—Premier Gen. Fazollah Zahedi, new "strong man" of Iran, met for the first time today with U. S. Ambassador Loy Henderson, in an apparent plea for American aid to a virtually bankrupt Iran.

(U.S. officials in Washington previously have indicated privately that Iran will have to adopt a more reasonable attitude on settling the oil nationalization dispute with Britain if it expects to receive additional American financial aid.)

Police Still Seeking Missing Smith Girl

WELLESLEY, Aug. 26 (INS)—Police today sought the aid of Smith College students throughout the country in the search for Sylvia Plath, 20, pretty junior-honor student, who vanished two days ago.

Police and volunteers, meanwhile, combed a five-mile stretch of woods that runs from the vicinity of the Plath home to the Weston line.
