Even Chinese Show Contempt of 'Progressives'

INCHON, Korea (U) — Chinese prison camp officials apparently had no further use for American POW "progressives" after the armistice was signed, a repatriated American prisoner said today.

Pfc. Leo E. Dwyer, Lawrence, Mass., said a Chinese POW camp interpreter reportedly told one of the "progressives" in Camp 3:

"The war is over now and we are done using you. You sold out your own country for cigarettes, and if we took you to China you would sell out China for cigarettes, too.

"And if you went to Russia, you might sell the Russians out for cigarettes.

"And if you went to some other country you probably would sell them out, too."

Dwyer said the interpreter's statement got out in camp—he did not reveal how—and that the "loyal American POWs" taunted the "progressives" with the information.

Riviera Robbery Nets \$300,000

ST. TROPEZ, France (U)—Police combed the Riviera coast today for a band of daring gunmen who snatched an estimated \$300,000 worth of uninsured jewelry and cash from a hotel here. Some of the gems belonged to a Paris jeweler whose wife had borrowed them from his store.

Smith Student, Found Under Porch, Recovers

WELLESLEY, Mass. (U) — Miss Sylvia Plath, 20, Smith College student discovered in the cellar of her home yesterday after a 40-hour police search, was reported in good condition at Wellesley-Newton Hospital today where she is recovering from an overdose of sleeping tablets.

The girl was found yesterday lying in a cellar-like recess beneath the porch of her home, hidden by a pile of kindling wood.

An empty water jar and a bottle containing eight sleeping pills was found by her side. The bottle had contained 48 pills, police said, when it was taken from the home. GAN Monday when

A search began Monday when the girl's mother, Mrs. Aurelia S. Plath, a Boston University professor, told police her daughter had vanished after leaving a note that she was taking a hike.

Her daughter, a frequent contributor of fiction and poetry to leading magazines, had been unable to write lately, and had been depressed, her mother said.

Woods Fire Again Starts Near Tower

A three-day old woodland fire on Rocky Mountain at the north side of Poet's Seat Tower, which called firemen out Monday afternoon and Tuesday morning, rekindled again this noon, but the area burned was very small.

The original fire is believed to have been set by children playing with matches.

U.S. Completes Vermont Map Started In '88

WASHINGTON (U) — The geological survey has completed the topographic mapping of Vermont, a job started in 1888.

The survey announced today the Burke quadrangle may have been printed and that the whole state series now is available for public sale.

The first maps in this series, the Rutland and Wallingford quadrangles, were prepared in 1888. A federal-state cooperative mapping program began in 1914, speeding up the process.

There are a total of 55 quadrangles covering Vermont. The publication scale is one inch to a mile, with a contour interval of 20 feet. Each map covers an area of about 215 square miles.

The maps are adapted to general use in the conservation and development of the state's natural resources.

Burke is in the northern part of the state, about 10 miles north-east of St. Johnsbury. Included in the final map are part of Burke, Newark, East Haven, Granby, Ferdinand, Brighton, Westmore, Sutton, Kirby, Lyndon, Victory and Lunenburg townships.

MARKET STEADIES, FOLLOWING DECLINES

NEW YORK (U)—The stock market held fairly steady today after three successive declines.

Prices usually changed less than a point either way with the emphasis somewhat on the higher side.

More Taxes for More Defense If Necessary

WASHINGTON (U) — Secretary of the Treasury Humphrey says that "if we have to increase defense spending, we can increase taxes to met these expenditures."

But he added, in an ABC Radio interview last night, that he did not think there is yet any need for increased outlays for defense.

Regardless of the expense, he declared, the nation will have adequate defense.

"I hope we don't have to increase taxes," he continued. He said all means of taxation, including sales and manufacturing taxes, were being studied.

Humphrey said he did not think Congress would be called into special session to raise the 275 billion dollar debt limit, which it refused earlier this year to hike to 290 billion, although the national debt was 2½ billion dollars from the ceiling.

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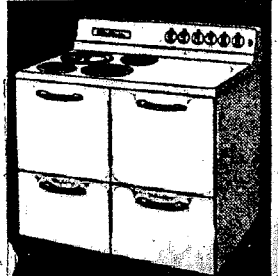
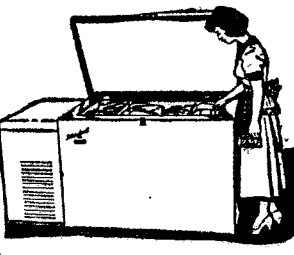
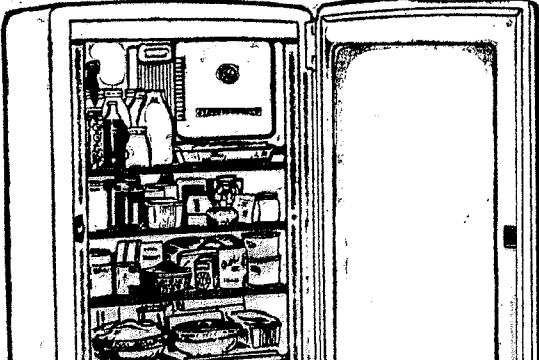


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
