Lane successfully prosecuted the Remington perjury case, the Frank Costello contempt trial, and charges against Gus Hall, Communist leader. He also presented evidence in the Rosenberg spy case.

Formerly of Melrose, Mass., Lane coached football at Boston University and at Harvard, and played hockey with the Bruin Cubs and New York Rangers.

Pills Missing In Wellesley Case

WELLESLEY, Mass. (UP) — Fear for the safety of a missing Smith college honor student increased today with disclosure that a bottle of sleeping pills is missing from her mother's locked cabinet. Miss Sylvia Plath, 20, disappeared Monday, leaving a note in which she said she was "taking a long walk—will be back tomorrow."

Her mother, Mrs. Aurelia Plath, said the girl was under a doctor's care for nervous exhaustion at the time of her disappearance.

Mrs. Plath said Sylvia, top student in the Smith College junior class last year, had become depressed over temporary loss of her ability to write poetry after having several verses published in national magazines.
