The Tudeh Communist party Central Committee littered the streets with pamphlets denouncing the Royalist coup that ended the rule-or-ruin regime of Mohammed Mossadegh. Calling on the people to "rise against the Anglo-American and shah coup d'etat against the people," the Communists said the "Anglo-American bayonets pointed at you" could be brushed aside through unity. It was the first open bid by the Communist since Gen. Fazollah Zahedi engineered the coup last week that toppled Mossadegh and returned the triumphant shah from exile.

HUNT SLAYING SUSPECT IN BOSTON, NEW YORK

Somerville (UP)—A comely brunette stenographer was variously reported as being in Boston and New York today as police sought her in the slaying and attempted cremation of her former sweetheart's 14-year-old sister. "She may be armed and should be considered dangerous," state police warned in ordering an eight-state search for Miss Mildred McDonald, 25, of Somerville. She was wanted for questioning in the death of Mary DiRocco, whose slashed and bullet-riddled body was found yesterday at the foot of the cellar stairs in her home here.

Milwaukee, Wis. (UP)—Milwaukee's six breweries today were threatened with another costly strike. Some 300 AFL machinists and mechanics, negotiating for higher wages, hinted at a walkout if their demands are not met.

Boston (UP)—Some 400 long lines operators and technicians of the American Telephone & Telegraph Co. were back at work today after a four-hour walkout in protest against the slowness of company-union contract negotiations.

CALLS FOR WITHDRAWAL OF ALL FOREIGN TROOPS FROM KOREA

Tokyo (UP)—Red China's Foreign Minister Chou En-Lai called today for the withdrawal for all foreign troops from Korea. Chou's statement, broadcast by Peiping radio, said the removal of Chinese Communist and United Nations armed forces should be the first order of business at the peace conference. He said, however, the Red China and the Democratic Republic of Korea, North Korea, should take part in the Far Eastern political conference. Chou suggested that the conference take the form of a round table forum, with nations which were not involved in the fighting invited to sit in with those which were. "However any decision of the conference must obtain the unanimous agreement of both sides of the Korean armistice before they are adopted," Chou said.

Boston (UP)—Lawyers who are Communists should be barred from the legal profession, an American Bar Association committee recommended today.

Hanover, Germany (UP)—German authorities sought today to muzzle and outlaw the Nazi-like German Reichs Party.

Lynn (UP)—A pyromaniac made a new attempt early today to burn a Central Avenue lodging house, and 23 lightly-clad occupants were driven to the street. Two fires were set this morning, one in a washroom and the other in a closet. They were quickly discovered by a woman tenant who called firemen. Damage was slight. A total of five fires have been set in the lodging house since Wednesday.

WIDE SEARCH BEING CONDUCTED FOR SMITH COLLEGE STUDENT

Wellesley, Mass. (UP)—A wide search was organized today for a top-ranking Smith College senior who disappeared from her home yesterday, leaving a note which said she was "taking a long hike." Miss Sylvia Plath, 20-year-old poetess whose work has been published in national magazines, told her widowed mother in the note that she would be back today. But Mrs. Aurelia S. Plath said her daughter was close to nervous collapse due to overstrain and was under a doctor's care. Miss Plath, who was highest ranking junior at Smith last year and held a full scholarship, had planned to complete her studies at the Northampton campus next month.
