Wellesley, Mass., (UP)—College honor student Miss Sylvia Plath, 20, was reported in "good" condition today after taking an overdose of sleeping pills. Newton-Wellesley Hospital attendants said the Smith College student, found in the cellar of her home yesterday after she had been listed as missing for two days, was responding to queries put to her by physicians. However authorities said she would not disclose what led her to take 40 to 50 sleeping capsules.

Fall River, Mass., (UP)—More than 2,800 CIO employees of the Firestone Industrial Products Co. here were on strike today for higher wages and extra fringe benefits. The firm is a division of the Firestone Tire & Rubber Co. Union officials had served notice 60 days ago that present contracts throughout the nation would be cancelled last midnight if no agreement was made. Firestone employs more than 24,000 production workers in eight cities.

Westboro, Mass (UP)—Two Worcester youths were injured when their motorcycle crashed after a 12-mile police chase on the wrong lane of the Worcester turnpike at speeds up to 100 miles per hour. The youths, Francis Vincent and Eugene Kaswell, both 21, were hospitalized yesterday when their cycle left the road and overturned in a field.

Salem, N. H. (UP)—The Rev. John C. Haney, Jr., said today he advocates that members of his First Congregational Church and other churches in the community pray for Salem's redemption. The 26-year-old pastor opened his campaign last Sunday. In his sermon he branded Salem as—and we quote—"the cesspool of New Hampshire in which liquor and gambling will bring on corrupt government, vice and murder." Salem is the home of the Rockingham Park race track.

LIFT NAVAL GUARD

Toyko (UP)—Gen. Mark W. Clark announced today the lifting of the United Nations naval guard around South Korea, imposed last year to prevent entry of enemy agents and contraband. The U. N. supreme commander said the set defense was lifted as further indication of the good faith of the Allies in adhering to the spirit and letter of the armistice... He added that the blockade had "proved extremely effective" but gave no details.

Quincy, Mass. (UP)—Miss Agnes Plante, 20, of Quincy was killed and two companions were critically injured early today when their car swerved out of control and struck a utility pole on Furnace Brook Parkway. A salesman found the blue plastic bag hidden under a suit rack in a Washington-street specialty shop yesterday and notified police. The widow, Mrs. Mary Gadsden, said the lost money represented the settlement of her husband's estate, plus \$5,000 of her own which she had brought to Boston to pay some bills.
