# Luciano Seized for Questioning

NAPLES, Aug. 25 (INS) — Naples police today seized Charles "Lucky" Luciano, one-time New York "vice lord," for questioning in connection with an international smuggling ring.

Vittorio Vitall, described by police as a notorious dope ring chief, fell into the Neapolitan police dragnet and it was on his testimony that police held Luciano, who was deported from the United States years ago.

Police emphasized that Luciano was "not under arrest" but was taken to police barracks "for a face-to-face meeting with Vitall."

Italian police co-operating with American authorities have kept a close watch on Luciano for years.

Luciano several times in the past few years has been named by American officials as head of a world narcotics smuggling ring. He always has denied such charges.

Last year 23 persons were indicted in San Francisco, Calif., charged with conspiracy in a nationwide heroin peddling business.

At that time George W. Cunningham, assistant chief of the narcotics bureau, named Luciano as the source of dope supply.

Two years ago federal narcotics and secret service agents in New York trapped 12 alleged members of a 30-million-dollar French-Mallorcan narcotics syndicate. Cunningham also was named then by U. S. authorities as head of the syndicate.
