Marblehead Girl Worker Missing

Left Town On Bicycle

Seen Passing Through Lynn

WELLESLEY — (AP) — Penelope Pitzler, 19, blonde college student, was reported missing today by her parents, who said the girl had left Marblehead yesterday to bicycle home.

A second-year student at Boston, where she is majoring in physical therapy, the girl had been working for the summer at the Eastern Yacht Club at Marblehead.

The girl's father, Herman Plotze of 41 Martin Road, Wellesley, talked with her yesterday by telephone at 3 P.M. She was reported seen passing through Lynn about 4:30 P.M. She is five feet eight inches tall, weighs 150 pounds and has light blonde hair.

SECOND DISAPPEARANCE
Penelope is the second college girl from Wellesley to disappear in a week. Earlier, Sylvia Plath, 20, a Smith student, was the object of a wide search.
She was found in the basement of her home, victim of an overdose of sleeping pills. She is reported in good condition in Newton-Wellesley Hospital.

Capsule Fountain of Youth Pills of Sex Hormones Aid Health of Oldsters

SAN FRANCISCO — (AP) — Dr. Robert Pearlman reports a pill costing from 30 to 40 cents has been "strikingly effective" in rejuvenating the health of old folks.

The San Francisco physician told the Gerontological Society yesterday that 150 middle and old age patients, after taking the capsule regularly, showed marked improvement in kidney and bladder disorders, sight, hearing, arthritic joints and drying skin.

The pill, he said, contains male and female sex hormones plus nutritious substances.

Pearlman added that laboratory tests showed improvement in heart action, muscular strength, liver function and blood cell counts.

He did not compare his experimental group with another, but chose instead to use all the aged in the community as a comparison, he said.

West Lynn Clay Pit Filling Expected to Start Shortly

City Executes Agreement With Owner of Those Nearest School

Dumping of municipal refuse into two water-filled West Lynn clay pits will begin within the next 10 days, it was expected today, after signing of an agreement between the city of Lynn and James and Sidney Pike, owners of two pits closest to the new Julia Callahan elementary school.

Arrangements have not been completed with Sanitary Department Superintendent George J. O'Shea, but Mayor Arthur J. Frawley indicated earlier this month that dumping operations would begin as soon as possible after signing of the agreement.

The project is part of the city's program for eliminating water hazards to children in the Walnut-Holyoke Street section of West Lynn. Last January, an eight-year-old boy lost his life in one of the man-made ponds near Walnut Street.

GRAVEL COVERING
Under the agreement reached between Mayor Frawley and the Pikes, the city will fill in the two abandoned pits and adjoining areas, covering the refuse with gravel. The property will remain privately owned.

The mayor indicated that about half of the refuse collected each week will go into the pits. It is expected that trucks collecting refuse West of Western Avenue

will dump their loads in the pits instead of going to Bishop Street. Meanwhile, the city has completed a taking of the huge water-filled pit on the southerly side of Holyoke Street, opposite Kestler Avenue. For the 245,000 square feet of land, the city paid the assessed valuation plus 25 per cent. This was agreed to by the Blakely, who is at the same time filling another pit on the opposite side of Holyoke Street.

Community agitation over the clay pit hazard was relayed early this year after the drowning of the eight-year-old boy, a tenant in the nearby Federal Housing project. It is estimated that there are some 2000 children in the area, including tenant of two housing developments and privately owned new homes. Also as part of the program the city sponsored a legislative act which eliminated the right to property in clay pits. Mildred May Avoid Chair

D. A. Not to Ask Death Penalty

SOMERVILLE — (AP) — Mildred McDonald, 25, the pretty stenographer, who admitted she killed the young sister of a man who left her to marry another, may not have to undergo a first degree murder trial.

That indication was given by Middlesex County District Attorney George E. Thompson, the man who would have to prosecute her.

STUDIES REPORTS

He said from his Vermont vacation spot that he had just completed studying "all aspects of the case and I am convinced the ends of justice will not be served by attempting to send this girl to the electric chair."

Thompson added: "This is a terrible tragedy involving two substantial, highly respected families of the community. The public is shocked by it. I will not seek a first degree murder indictment nor shall I press for capital punishment for her."

Thompson's statement to reporters followed a day filled with developments that were heart-breaking to both families involved — that of Miss McDonald's and that of Mary Di Rocco, 14, who suffered five bullet wounds, superficial throat slashes and burns from newspapers that were piled around her and set afire.

Teen-Agers Arrested In Auto Thefts

Rapid action by two off-duty policemen, one from Lynn and the other from Saugus, yesterday afternoon led to the arrest of four Saugus teenagers for stealing parts from a Lynn auto lot.

Two of the youngsters were apprehended at 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon by Lynn Patrolman Joseph J. Caproni in the lot at Cap's Auto Parts, Inc., at 1069 Western Avenue.

The other two were picked up later in Saugus by one of the town's officers, Sergeant Ernest Dunham, who worked on the case even though it was his day off.

A \$10 radio led to the capture of the youths, three of whom are 16 years old. The other is 17.

Albert Caproni, part owner of the firm, called his cousin, Officer Caproni, at 2 P.M. to report a hidden radio had been discovered.

Warrant Issued For Ben Gold, As Result of NLRB Affidavit

WASHINGTON — (AP) — A Federal grand jury here today indicted Ben Gold, fur workers' union president, on charges that he lied when he swore in an affidavit to the National Labor Relations Board in August, 1950, that he was not a Communist.

Immediately after the perjury indictment was returned, the Justice officials are required to file affidavits in their department announced a non-Communist affidavit to their warrant had been issued for Gold, a New Yorker and that the government will ask that his bond be set at \$10,000.

Gold is head of the International Fur and Leather Workers Union of the United States and Canada. It has local offices in Lynn and Peabody. This law, Max Young, 49, of New York City, described as an important infiltration by Communists.
