

Tokyo (UP)—Red China's Foreign Minister Chou En-Lai called today for the withdrawal for all foreign troops from Korea. Chou's statement, broadcast by Peiping radio, said the removal of Chinese Communist and United Nations armed forces should be the first order of business at the peace conference. He said, however, the Red China and the Democratic Republic of Korea, North Korea, should take part in the Far Eastern political conference. Chou suggested that the conference take the form of a round table forum, with nations which were not involved in the fighting invited to sit in with those which were. "However any decision of the conference must obtain the unanimous agreement of both sides of the Korean armistice before they are adopted," Chou said.

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Nantucket, Mass., (UP)—Cullen Sweeney, 20, of Grosse Pointe, Mich., was killed yesterday when his sports car lurched out of control at a curve and overturned several times. The son of Detroit Atty John Sweeney was found pinned beneath the car by a fellow Nantucket summer resident, John B. Moran, also of Grosse Pointe, who was following in another car.

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WIDE SEARCH BEING CONDUCTED FOR SMITH COLLEGE STUDENT

Wellesley, Mass. (UP)—A wide search was organized today for a top-ranking Smith College senior who disappeared from her home yesterday, leaving a note which said she was "taking a long hike." Miss Sylvia Plath, 20-year-old poetess whose work has been published in national magazines, told her widowed mother in the note that she would be back today. But Mrs. Aurelia S. Plath said her daughter was close to nervous collapse due to overstrain and was under a doctor's care. Miss Plath, who was highest ranking junior at Smith last year and held a full scholarship, had planned to complete her studies at the Northampton campus next month.

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Washington, Pa. (UP)—Mrs. Elizabeth Murray, widow of the late CIO and United Steelworkers president, was in fair condition in Washington Hospital today with injuries suffered in an automobile accident near here. Mrs. Mary Thompson, Canonsburg, Murray's only sister, was in serious condition at Mercy Hospital in Pittsburgh. Hospital attendants said Mrs. Thompson was given the last rites of the Catholic Church. Mrs. Marie N Block, Pittsburgh, who was driving the car in which the two women were riding, also was reported in serious condition at Washington Hospital.

Worcester, Mass., (UP)—Six New England prisoners of war repatriated in the armistice exchange of captives in Korea fell into the arms of laughing, crying relatives last night at Worcester Airport. The ex-POW's were Pfc. William Curtis of Boston, Cpl. Edward W. Lipper of Brockton, Sgt. Donald Falconeiri of Middleboro, Pfc. John F. Teal of Hartford, Conn., Sgt. Joseph G. Paquette of Grosvenor Dale, Conn., and Cpl. Richard Grenier of Howland, Me. Each received a key to the city from Mayor Andrew B. Holmstrom.

Reduced Retired Pay Inv Under this bill, retired Far Navy personnel, including Fleet Reservists, may elect to receive reduced retired or retainer pay to purchase up to one-half their retired or retainer pay to provide a life annuity for dependents, in event of their prior death.

Heretofore, a retired or reserve man saw his retired or retainer pay halted upon death. No further pay would be made to his dependents. These dependents, when the veteran involved passed away, were compelled to seek widow or other pension as established by the Veterans Administration for surviving dependents.
