"I am going for a hike and will be back tomorrow."

Mrs. Plath said her daughter had been nervous and under a doctor's care for several months. She said her daughter, an honor student, had been advised to de- vote less time to academic activi- ties in the interest of her health.

When last seen, Miss Plath was wearing a blue denim skirt and a blue Jersey blouse. She is five feet, nine, and weighs 140 pounds. Her hair and eyes are brown.
