WELLESLEY, (INS)—A brilliant 20-year-old Smith college senior today was recovering from an overdose of sleeping pills as police sought to determine if she spent the two days she was missing in a tiny cellar recess of her home.

Sylvia Plath, honor student and literary contributor to National Magazines, was discovered lying behind a pile of kindling wood on a narrow ledge between the basement and a porch of her home. Beside her was found a water container and eight sleeping pills in a bottle which originally contained 50 tablets.

Police admitted it was possible she might have been in the cellar throughout the search for her. However, they pointed out that when she was found she was wearing different clothing than she wore when she last was seen.

Cent Increase To Boston Milk Suppliers

BOSTON—Farmers supplying the Greater Boston area will receive approximately one cent more per quart of milk starting Sept. 1. Acting Federal Market Administrator Robert Cherry announced yesterday. At the same time, Jerry Bond Jr., State Director of Milk Control, an-

nounced similar increases for the Weston, Hull and Cape Cod areas. Bond said the one-cent increase or about 44 cents a hundred-weight, will be payable to producers for milk delivered during the month of September. He said 22 cents of the 44 is the normal seasonal increase, and the other 22 cents is due to a change in the supply-demand adjustment factor.

Brownell Labels National Lawyers Guild Subversive

BOSTON (INS)—Attorney General Herbert Brownell, Jr., condemned the National Lawyers Guild today as "The legal mouthpiece of the Communist party" and said he intends to place the group on his list of subversive organizations.

In a prepared speech before the American Bar association, Brownell charged that the Lawyer's Guild "has been in the hands of card-carrying Communists and prominent fellow-travelers since 1945."

He gave the organization 10 days to show cause why it should not be listed as subversive, but a formal protest could delay final action for several months.

In another development, Brownell announced a crackdown on former federal officials now representing private companies before the same agencies for which they worked in the past two years.

The cabinet officer, indicating the practice is widespread, said it is against the law and a "crime" even though the statute banning such activity "has never been enforced."

Brownell said he reached his decision against the Lawyers Guild after a study conducted "with great care." He pointed out that when it was organized in 1937 the Guild "attracted some well-known and completely loyal American citizens, including many colored members."

In 1944, however, the House Un-American Activities committee cited the organization as a Communist front and described it as "The legal bulwark of the Communist party."

Brownell made these other points in his speech:

1. The number of major crimes committed in the U. S. last year totalled more than two million. He said "This record is a national disgrace" which "imperils our governmental system."

2. The government will use a relentless crackdown on racketeers and deport them, where possible, "as long as they continue to violate our laws."

3. The Justice department "has an obligation to supply leadership in a drive against racketeers but there is no reason to create a federal force. Local police should do the job," he said.

Arrest Made In Lawrence Robbery

LAWRENCE, (INS)—Milton Port, 40, member of a well-known Baltimore family, was ordered for the grand jury in \$40,000 charge growing out of a \$190000 theatre robbery, Aug. 16.

District Court Judge John J. Coy found probable cause to hold Port on charges of armed robbery and carrying a revolver without permit.

Sgt. Carl B. Schiavone of the Lawrence police told the court the port admitted loosing \$1700 in and dog race bets in two days of the robbery.

Niport was picked up at Rockham Park race track, Salem, by police. The defendant was sent by Atty. Samuel Jaff Lynn and his brother, Atty. Le Niport of Baltimore. Police arrested they were awaiting at least warrants from New York, in Niport in connection with robbery there.
