

Two Hurt In Westboro Motor Crash

WESTBORO, (INS)—Two Worcester youths, whose names were withheld by police, were injured seriously last night when their motorcycle crashed into a wall after a 12-mile police chase that started in Worcester.

State Trooper William Konderwicz of the Grafton Barracks reported the motorcycle whirled out of control, swerved off the highway, narrowly missed a tree and crashed into the wall. Konderwicz summoned an ambulance by radio.

He reported the motorcycle passed him at high speed on Route 20 in Worcester and that when he started in pursuit, the motorcycle increased speed to nearly 100 miles an hour.

Wellesley Girl Took 40 Sedatives

WELLESLEY, (INS)—Pretty Sylvia Plath, brilliant Smith college student and literary contributor to National Magazines who vanished mysteriously Monday, was found yesterday asleep in the cellar of her home.

The 20-year-old student-poet had taken 40 to 50 capsules of a sodium-potassium sedative, which she had obtained through a doctor.

Sylvia was found as a 100-man searching party scoured the countryside around Wellesley, including the Rocky Ledge area.

Sylvia had left a note for her mother, Mrs. Aurelia S. Plath, a Boston University professor, stating she was going to take a long walk. The mother said that her daughter had been despondent over a temporary inability to go on with creative writing.

She was taken to Newton-Wellesley hospital, where physicians said she would recover.

Her latest poem, written when she was guest editor of the current issue of the magazine "Mademoiselle," was entitled "Mad Girl's Love Song." It began and ended with the words: "I shut my eyes and all the world drops dead."

Finding of the girl put at rest fears expressed by police chief Robert M. McVey that Sylvia may have committed suicide.

Map Strategy For Crime Busting Plans

DENVER, (INS)—Big City district attorneys and small-town prosecutors from all over the nation have gathered in Denver to map strategy for integrating their crime-busting activities.

The national Assn of County and Prosecuting Attorneys' (NACPA) will spend four days in discussions on bringing the hodgepodge of state laws into harmony and solving mutual problems by working together.

The group was formed three years ago in the wake of the Kefauver crime probe after U. S. Atty. Gen. J. Howard McGrath urged local prosecutors to "get together and do something about organized crime."

Executive NACPA Vice President Bert Keating of Denver, host to the convention, admits the organization is still "a network with a long-range program and a short budget."

But, he adds, its impact "is already being felt in the unification and streamlining of criminal prosecution procedures."

The Denver district attorney points out, for instance, that millions of dollars have been saved by welfare agencies in the past, few years by cracking down on "fade-way fathers," family heads who skip the state to avoid supporting dependents.

The prosecutors still have a long way to go in the field, however, and one of their panels will discuss a uniform support-of-dependents act.

They will also discuss uniform extradition laws to ease the return of other fugitives from justice who frustrate prosecution by fleeing the

Three GIs From Mass Released

PANMUNJOOM (INS)—The Communists freed 150 more American war prisoners today but these included only a trickle of officers rather than the scores which had been expected.

Three Bay State GIs and one from Maine were in the list: Sgt. Howard Pentz, Melrose; Sgt. Guy T. Vadala, Stoneham; Sgt. George Conrad, Dorchester, and Cpl. Vernon Clark, Brooks, Me.; Cpl. John A. Gilbert, Littleton, N. H., and Cpl. Richard F. Douglas, Burlington, Vt.

Ten commissioned U. S. officers ranging in rank up to captain were in the latest group of repatriates who came through Panmunjom's freedom gate.

However, the Communists said that among 400 Allied prisoners slated for liberation tomorrow will be an additional 144 Americans. This renewed the prospect that many more U. S. officers may soon be released.

Repatriates passing through Panmunjom during the past two days reported that 395 American officers and 25 air force enlisted men have been moved from North Korea's camp two to Kaesong, the last stepping stone to freedom.
