WELLESLEY, Mass. (INS) — A  
brilliant 20-year-old Smith Col-  
lege senior today was recovering  
from an overdose of sleeping pills  
as police sought to determine if  
she spent the two days she was  
missing in a tiny cellar recess of  
her home.

Sylvia Plath, honor student and  
literary contributor to national  
magazines, was discovered lying  
behind a pile of kindling wood on  
a narrow ledge between the base-  
ment and a porch of her home.  
Beside her was found a water  
container and eight sleeping pills  
in a bottle which originally con-  
tained 50 tablets.

Police admitted it was possible  
she might have been in the cellar  
throughout the search for her.  
However, they pointed out that  
when she was found she was wear-  
ing different clothing than she  
wore when she last was seen.

### Bricker To Fight For Treaty Law

**Opposition**  
WASHINGTON (INS) — Sen.  
John W. Bricker (R-O.) said to-  
day he will ignore the outspoken  
opposition of Secretary of State  
John Foster Dulles and fight for  
his plan to limit presidential  
treaty-making powers.

Bricker curtly brushed aside  
Dulles' comment yesterday before  
the American Bar Association.  
Dulles said the proposed constitu-  
tional amendment would be "cal-  
lanitous," if adopted.

The senator charged that Dulles  
is "trying to confuse" the public,  
and added: "Mr. Dulles shows he  
doesn't understand the meaning of  
the constitutional amendment or,  
evidently, the Constitution itself."

Bricker served blunt notice that  
the secretary's blast will not  
thwart his efforts to seek enact-  
ment when Congress reconvenes  
in January. He said:

"I knew what I was doing when  
I did it. I have not changed my  
mind on it — and he can't change  
it."  
Bricker insisted that the amend-
