The wavy-haired college girl had been staying at the Marblehead home of an aunt, Miss Emily Thorne. When the girl did not arrive at Wellesley, her parents went to the Thorne home where they found two packed bags but learned their daughter had ridden away on her bicycle.

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THE FIRST EVENT of the opening day will be the light weight horse pulling contest at 2 p.m. When this is completed the medium weight horse pulling contest will take place. Monday night at 8 p.m. the heavyweights will do their stuff.

The horse pulling contests are open events. The light weights are 3,000 pounds and under and neither horse is to exceed 16 hands high measured from the top of the shoes. The medium weight horses run from 3,000 to 3,400 pounds and the heavyweights are over 3,400 pounds. Prizes of \$100 are offered for the winners of each event. Second
