## TRIO HURT, ONE SERIOUSLY, AS RIGGING FALLS

Donald Soden of Agawam Believed Critically in Scaffold Crash

An Agawam man suffered serious head injuries and two others were shaken up this morning when a scaffolding collapsed while they were shingling a two-story home at Thompsonville, Conn.

Donald Soden of Carr Ave., Agawam, was rushed to Mercy Hospital by Enfield Police and he was in the emergency room at press time. Police said his condition appeared critical. Hospital attendants could not disclose the exact extent of injury.

The two men working with Soden, Earl Larson, Sr., and Earl Larson, Jr., both of Prospect Hill, Warehouse Point, Conn., landed on grass when the rigging collapsed and were just bruised and shaken.

Police said Soden fell 20 feet headlong into a pile of shingles and other building supplies. He was given first aid at the scene by Patrolmen Alec Dubois and Patrick Conley.

Lt. David Luke of the Enfield Police said the three men were putting shingles on the home of Mrs. Fred Malard of 32 Frew Ter., Thompsonville, when the scaffolding collapsed. Cause of the collapse was not known.

## Mother Flying From London On False Hopes; Police Find

Cruel Disappointment Faces Mrs. Henegan in 3-Year Search for Missing Boy, 8

Chicago, Aug. 28—The mother of missing Elbert Henegan is expected to arrive in Chicago before the week is over but only sad news will greet her about her missing son.

Capt. Frank A. Kaveney was informed by the FBI at Washington today that no identification could be made of an eight-year-old boy's body found several months ago near Lincoln, Neb.

Local police believed the boy might be that of the missing Henegan boy who was nearly five when he disappeared near the banks of the Chicago River while playing snowboys with some friends.

The FBI reported their fingerprint bureau could make no possible identification of the body because of its condition.

Meanwhile, Mrs. Henegan left for the United States from London.

## ANGRY DRIVER WHO LEFT BUS IS FINED \$10

Halted for Speeding, He Left Passengers Stranded for 45 Minutes

Pittsfield, Aug. 28—The driver of an Interstate bus who was stopped for speeding here yesterday and then stalked angrily away from the policeman; leaving his 18-passengers on the Albany-bound bus, paid a \$10 fine in District Court today.

Herbert R. Stewart of New Haven pleaded guilty to the speeding complaint, made by Patrolman Merton Vincent. After getting the ticket, the bus driver shouted "this is it..." to the policeman, turned his back on the passengers and nudged up the highway and disappeared.

Police put in a rush call to the bus company's Springfield office for a relief driver. Stewart, however, returned in 45 minutes and drove off with his passengers to Albany.

## MONTANA MAN BECOMES NEW HEAD OF ABA

William J. Jameson Long Active in Bar Association Affairs

Boston, Aug. 28 (AP)—William J. Jameson of Billings, Mont., was sworn in today as the 77th president of the American Bar Association.

Jameson, active in ABA affairs for more than two decades, succeeds Robert C. Storey of Dallas, Tex., dean of Southern Methodist University Law School.

He was administered the oath at the close of the ABA's diamond jubilee convention here. Some 6000 delegates attended the convention.

## Delegate Says Not 'Standing Down'; U. S. Ambassador Lauds Action as 'Generous, Statesmanlike'

United Nations, N. Y., Aug. 28 (AP)—India today withdrew from the running for a seat at the Korean Political Conference.

Indian Delegate V. K. Krishna Menon asked the United Nations General Assembly not to "hurry to a decision" on a resolution sponsored by most of the British Commonwealth countries asking a seat at the Korean parity for India.

The resolution was passed yesterday by the Assembly's political committee in a 27-21 vote. But the ballot fell far short of the two-thirds majority required for approval of India's nomination by the full Assembly.

"We don't say we are standing down," Menon told the Assembly, "because we have not been a candidate. But as members of this general Assembly we feel that the best course to be adopted is not to force it to a vote."

"I hope in these circumstances that those who have supported us..."

## DEVER LIKELY AS CANDIDATE FOR SENATOR

Announcement Withheld Since He Might Decide to Run For Governor

Boston, Aug. 28 (INS)—Gov. Paul A. Dever today was reported planning to campaign for the seat of U. S. Sen. Leverett Saltonstall, but was quoted as saying he will withhold final announcement until the Jefferson-Jackson Day banquet of Massachusetts Democrats in January.

In the first hint of his political plans since he left office in January, the ex-governor was reported to have said:

"Right now I am looking towards the senatorship, but I do not want to close the door on the possibility that I might change my mind and run for a third term as governor."

The State Democratic Committee will decide on Sept. 26 whether to hold a pre-primary convention in April to pick a slate of candidates for the next state election.

## PRETTY GIRL MISSING FROM NORTH SHORE

Eastern Yacht Club Employee Not Heard From Since Tuesday Night

Marblehead, Aug. 28 (AP)—Miss Penelope Protze, 18-year-old attractive blonde from Wellesley Hills, Mass., was reported missing here today.

Police said the girl had been working at the Eastern Yacht Club on Marblehead Neck. Tuesday night, she left by bicycle to visit an aunt, Miss Emily Thorne, here.

When she failed to arrive, Miss Thorne assumed she had gone home to Wellesley Hills.

A checkup disclosed that she had disappeared.

Miss Protze is the second Wellesley girl to be reported missing this week. The other, Miss Sylvia Pfaff, 20, Smith College student, was found in the cellar of her own home after an organized search.

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## Yale Prof Denies Brownell Charge

New Haven, Conn., Aug. 28 (AP)—Yale law Prof. Thomas I. Emerson, former head of the National Lawyers Guild, today denied a charge by Atty. Gen. Herbert R. Brownell, Jr., that the organization was a "legal mousetrap" for the Communist Party.

Emerson added, however, that the guild's policies sometimes "coincided" with those of the Reds.

Emerson, now a member of the guild's executive committee, said the group plans to fight Brownell's placing of the guild on his list of subversive organizations.

He pointed out that the guild supported the United Nations action in Korea and denounced Prague trials as anti-Semitic.
