Colombia's Woman Judge Visits Wilbraham Academy

Here to See Son, Dr. DeJaramillo Awaits Return of More Liberal Policies in South America

The only woman judge in Colombia, South America, and who is a possible choice as a United Nations delegate from her country was guest yesterday at Wilbraham Academy where her son is a student. Dr. Fabiola Aguiara de Jaramillo, who served as a justice on the Tribunal of Colombia, is visiting in the United States while waiting for the political climate in Colombia to be more favorable to liberal ideas, and a fair interpretation of justice. Unsympathetic to the dictatorship established in Colombia, and feeling that her long identification with the Liberal party would not be received favorably, Dr. Jaramillo left South America recently for a lengthy tour of the United States. However, with recent developments toward a freer government and first free elections scheduled this year, Dr. Jaramillo feels more hopeful about the future of Colombia. Headmaster Charles Stevens said the Senora was extremely interested in the work of United Nations and would no doubt be closely associated with UN in the future. He described her as "one of the most distinguished women of South

America." She is the widow of a former president of Colombia and the wife of a former cabinet member. She has a doctor's degree in law and a master's degree in psychology. Senora de Jaramillo was in Wilbraham to discuss her son's progress, and his future plans with the headmaster. The 16-year old student will complete his final year in the fall and will probably go into the scientific field. Mr. Stevens said that "her findings in court cases didn't favor a dictator or his methods. She has been noted for fair adjudication. She has always been on the side of free thinking people. She found it wise to leave while not in favor. However, the situation has been corrected now and she may return sooner than anticipated."

Her son has been at Wilbraham for about a year and a half, and came to Wilbraham on recommendation of a former Baron, who knew about the international representation at the Academy. He is described by the headmaster as an "outstanding boy." Dr. de Jaramillo and her son left Wilbraham yesterday afternoon for Boston.

Horse Found, Rustler Missing

"Buckie," a golden colored horse stolen Friday from the Springfield Riding Academy by an 18 or 17 year old youth, was found cavorting about Somers, Conn., yesterday afternoon minus the black saddle it wore when the youth rode it away from the stable. The case marked one of the few cases of horse rustling to come to the attention of local police in recent years. Springfield police said that the horse was located and caught by

a man identified only as Mr. Schfield of Somers. The riding school animal belongs to the Driftwood Club, and police notified Harold Hyde of that organization that the animal had been located. Friday afternoon about 1 p. m. a youth went to the Riding Academy and rented the horse for a ride, telling grooms on duty he would return in about an hour. Several hours later when he failed to return police were notified of the case.

Variance to Establish Nursing Unit

Holyoke, Aug. 24—No objections were recorded at a public hearing tonight by the Board of Appeals in the aldermanic chamber on the petition of Mrs. Dolorose Filos of 44 Sumner Ave., Springfield for a zoning variance to permit a nursing home in the Mackintosh home at 1913 Northampton St.

Mrs. Filos recently sold her house, used as a nursing home in Springfield. It will be converted into a Jewish funeral parlor.

The three members of the board took the petition under advisement. Each member will write out his decision and the board's announcement will be made public within a few days. The unanimous approval of board members is required by law to permit the variance.

If the petition is granted Mrs. Filos will purchase the home from Donald C. Mackintosh, president of the Mechanics Savings Bank.

The petition was brought before the appeals board by Mrs. Filos when she was denied a building permit. The home is located in residential area, disallowing its use as a nursing home.

Several persons from the area of the Mackintosh home attended the hearing, but their interest was in the protection of a sewer line and a water line which runs through the property and a right of way.

The hearing was in contrast to the scene at a hearing some months ago when Edna Spies Williams petitioned the board for a variance to allow her to operate an inn at the Mackintosh home. Many members of the Blessed Sacrament parish appeared at the hearing to protest that petition.

Student at Smith Reported Missing

Wellesley, Aug. 24 (AP)—A Smith College honor student was reported missing tonight by her mother, a Boston University professor.

Mrs. Aurelia S. Plath told police her daughter, Sylvia, 20, left home early in the afternoon after writing a note she was "going for a hike" and would return tomorrow.

Mrs. Plath said that her daughter has been "nervous" and under a doctor's care for several months.

The girl, who is scheduled to enter her senior year at Smith College next month, has sold short stories and poems to magazines. As a college junior, she was editor of the Smith Review, the college literary magazine, and a member of the school's press board.
