

Missing Smith Senior Found

Wellesley, Mass. (AP)—A pretty 20-year-old Smith College senior—who vanished Monday after telling her mother she was going hiking—was found yesterday semi-conscious but apparently uninjured under the porch of her home.

While searchers fanned out in a widespread search, Sylvia Plath was located by her brother, Warren, 18, and her grandmother, Mrs. Aurelia Schobar, 66, who heard morning coming from the cellar of her home.

The girl was found behind a pile of lumber in a tiny space under the porch, through which entrance is gained by a 2 1/2 foot opening about five feet above the cellar floor.

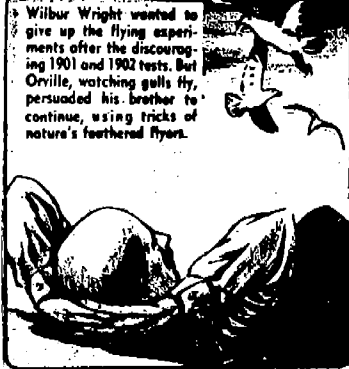
Police Chief Robert McVey said an empty water jar and a container of eight sleeping tablets were found by the girl's side. He said the bottle had contained 48 tablets when full.

Her mother, Mrs. Aurelia S. Plath, a Boston University professor, said her daughter recently had been depressed because she felt "she was unworthy of the confidence held for her by the people she knew."

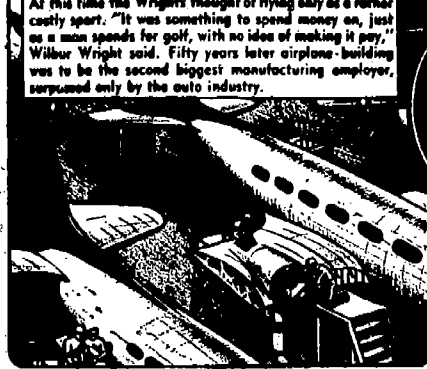

Zionist Unit Opposes Aid To Arabs

New York (AP)—The Zionist Organization of America opened its 56th annual convention last night with a declaration opposing U. S. military aid to Arab states until the Arab nations agree to make peace with Israel.

Rabbi Irving Miller, president of the organization, said in a prepared speech that "powerful anti-Israel forces" are attempting to swing the U. S. government away

from its policy of friendship toward Israel.

"We are unalterably opposed to the supply of arms to any of the Arab states as long as they persist in their refusal to make peace with Israel and continue to threaten renewed warfare," he said.

Some 1,200 delegates from the 48 states are expected to attend the convention.
