## Market Gains After 2 Days Of Decline

NEW YORK, Aug. 26 (AP)—The stock market was moderately active and higher today at the opening following two days of decline. Gains ran into the major fractions, although most were small. Minus signs were scarce at the start. Benquet Consolidated Mining, the day's most active issue yesterday, opened today on a block of 6000 shares unchanged at 1 1/2. New York Central, yesterday's second most active issue, opened today on a block of 1200 shares up 1/2 at 22 3/4. Baltimore & Ohio started on 1000 shares up 1/2 at 23 3/4. Among other gainers were American Telephone, Anaconda Copper, Bethlehem Steel, Republic Steel, Southern Railway, and Boeing. Lower were Texas Co., U. S. Steel, Westinghouse Electric, and International Telephone.

## Continue Search For Smith Senior

WELLESLEY, Aug. 26 (AP)—Search continued today for Sylvia Plath, 20, a Smith College senior who disappeared Monday after leaving a note for her mother that she was going for a hike. The mother, Mrs. Aurelia S. Plath, a Boston University professor, said her daughter's disappearance may have been due to a temporary nervous disorder linked with her writing. Miss Plath was editor of the Smith Review, the college literary magazine, last year, and has sold fiction and poetry to magazines and other publications. Mrs. Plath said her daughter "recently felt she was unworthy of the confidence held for her by the people she knew. For some time she has been unable to write either fiction, or her more recent love, poetry. "Instead of regarding this as just as arid period that every writer faces at times," the mother said, "she believed something had happened to her mind, that it was unable to produce creatively any more."
