25,000 RUBBER WORKERS ARE SET TO START STRIKE AT MIDNIGHT

Akron, O. (UP)—Officials of the CIO United Rubber Workers Union said today 25,000 of its members at Firestone Tire & Rubber Company plants in eight cities are poised to strike at midnight tonight.

Claremont, N. H. (UP)—A Claremont soldier was the fourth New Hampshire serviceman to walk through Freedom Gate enroute home from a North Korean prison camp. Cpl. Irving D. Bloodgett, Jr., who was reported missing July 14th, was released last night as part of "operation Big Switch." His mother told newsmen that "needless to say, we're going to give him everything he wants when he gets home."

Bad Zwischenahn, Germany (UP)—Karl Janssen told doctors today he felt "just wonderful." Janssen Tuesday coughed up a bullet that had been in his lung since 1944.

Washington (UP)—Adm. Arthur W. Radford, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, said today that the fact Russia has the H-bomb will force this country to review and strengthen its air defenses.

CHECK STOLEN REVOLVER FOR MURDER CLUE
Holyoke, (UP)—A .38 caliber revolver stolen from a Springfield gasoline filling station was examined today by ballistics experts seeking a clue in the fatal shooting of Holyoke Alderman Henry H. Noel in his home last week. The weapon was stolen the morning before the 72-year-old Republican state committeeman was slain by an intruder whom he surprised in his living room. The gun was found in the possession of a Woonsocket, R. I., man who was held on a variety of charges.

Wellesley, (UP)—Fear for the safety of a missing Smith college honor student increased today with disclosure that a bottle of sleeping pills is missing from her mother's locked cabinet. Miss Sylvia Plath, 20, disappeared Monday, leaving a note in which she said she was "taking a long walk—will be back tomorrow."

Concord, N. H. (UP)—State forestry officials reported today that three woodland fires set by lightning during Monday's storm were under control.

United Nations, N. Y., (UP)—Britain pledged today that disagreement on the composition of the Far Eastern political conference will not cause a major split between London and its Western allies.

SHAH OF IRAN SAYS COUNTRY DESPERATELY IN NEED OF MONEY

Tehran, Iran (UP)—U. S. Ambassador Loy W. Henderson called on Iranian Premier Fazollah Zabei today and an embassy spokesman said they "discussed all mutual outstanding problems." The embassy said the U. S. Point Four program would be continued, giving Iran \$23,500,000 this year and possibly more money for developing projects. Informed Iranian sources said Iran might receive an additional \$30,000,000 under the Point Four program. The shah of Iran, brought back from brief exile after his supporters had overthrown the regime of Premier Mohammed Mossadegh in a bloody coup, said upon his return that his country desperately needed money.
