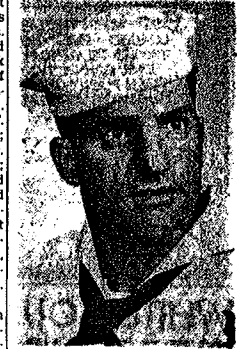

Sylvia Plath, honor student and literary contributor to national magazines, was discovered lying behind a pile of kindling wood on a narrow ledge between the basement and a porch of her home. Beside her was found a water container and eight sleeping pills in a bottle which originally contained 50 tablets.

Police admitted it was possible she might have been in the cellar throughout the search for her. However, they pointed out that when she was found she was wearing different clothing than she wore when she last was seen.
